I. Editorial


Word from the Chairman of GSAC Alliance

The year 2020 will have been a year of trial, marked by the sudden outbreak and virulence of the COVID-19 pandemic. Originally attributed to a zoonotic infection, which is transmitted by the pangolin or the bat. This disease perhaps expresses a biodiversity crisis, which is symptomatic of a close links crisis between the health of natural ecosystems, that of the animal kingdom and of human health. This pandemic, with disastrous consequences on human lives, economies, including the conservation sector, is a strong signal concerning the emerging environmental crises to be afraid of, which the world should be prepared to face repeatedly.

In addition to threatening directly great apes populations that can contract the virus, organizational disruptions are major.

Indeed, important changes such as closing of borders and Protected Areas, cancelling of tourist activities and certain funding, restrictions in terms of movement, the implementing barrier measures, and reducing surveillance activities ... , are all factors that today increase threats to great apes, their environments and the well-being of local populations.

In addition, international meetings such as the IUCN World Conservation Congress and the African Primatological Society (APS) which are crucial events and showcases for promoting local initiatives and advocacy for stakeholders of the community conservation of great apes and forests of the Congo Basin could not be held.

As this report is being written, Africa is experiencing a second strain of Covid-19 with more virulent variants and naturally disastrous consequences for great apes and local communities.


To date, the GSAC Alliance has been able to stay the course by focusing most of its activities on professionalizing its network and developing political advocacy at the sub-regional level, which is a key instrument of the network's strategy.

Thanks to the resilience of the members and with the technical and financial support of our partners, we succeeded in carrying out several activities in 2020, including the organizing a sub-regional forum for promoting local initiatives in community conservation of great apes.

I can therefore confirm that in this context of turmoil and challenges, bringing together members of the network and local communities living in these areas of high ecological value is a guarantee of success for developing inclusive conservation.

II. About the Alliance

The Alliance for the Conservation of Great Apes in Central Africa (Alliance GSAC) is the first network bringing together local Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) working for the community protection of great apes of the Congo Basin forests in Central Africa. Established in October 2017, this network currently brings together 7 field-based CSOs from Cameroon, Gabon, Congo and DR Congo.

These local actors work in close collaboration with the inhabitants of their operating sites and put in place solutions

adapted to the challenges of protecting great apes, while contributing to local development of Congo Basin territories that are keeping these species.

The GSAC Alliance functions both as a technical platform for discussions on and learning development issues as well as protecting endangered species, but also as a political and institutional instrument to enhance the legitimacy of its members, nationally and internationally.

The GSAC Alliance works in perspective of developing an environment where harmony between great apes and populations generates sustainable socio-economic well-being for preserving World Heritage. Its main mission is to synergize the proven expertise of member NGOs, to strengthen their visibility and influence political decisions to make great ape conservation actions more effective in the forests of the Congo Basin. The work of the GSAC Alliance is divided in three main areas:

- Enhance the professional development of the network and the members
- Influence policies for the conservation of great apes
- Share and value the members' conservation actions

II.II. The staff office and the technical staff

The staff office

The GSAC Alliance staff office is responsible for executing the decisions of the General Assembly (GA) and ensuring the daily and operational management of network activities. As such, the staff office represents the GSAC Alliance with third parties and coordinates the network on a daily basis. It draws up the situation of the accounts and balance sheet; prepares budget forecasts and activity reports to be submitted for approval to the GA; ensures the legitimacy of the network between two AGs. The staff office is made up of 3 people (the President, the Secretary General, the Treasurer). They all coordinate and order the technical work and the expenditure chain.

The technical staff

Recruited by the staff office, the technical staff is made up of a Technical Assistant (TA), an Administrative and Financial Manager (RAF) and sometimes interns.

The technical staff is responsible for planning, executing, and coordinating the activities as defined by the members during the annual GA. On a daily basis, he is responsible for: setting up fund-raising projects; ensure internal communication and manage external communication tools (newsletter, website, etc.); prepare technical reports for donors; ensure the accounts and budgetary monitoring of network projects; and prepare financial reports. All under the supervision and approval of the staff office.

III. About the members of the network

To date, 7 local African civil society organizations spread over 4 countries of the Congo Basin (Cameroon, Congo Brazzaville; Democratic Republic of Congo; Gabon) make up the GSAC Alliance network, namely:



Endangered Species International Congo (Esi Congo) Association in Congo Brazzaville

Established in 2009, ESI-Congo works in protecting gorillas and chimpanzees and for the community development of populations present in the South of Congo. It is at 150 km from Pointe-Noire, in an area located between the Conkouati National Park, the Reserve of Dimonika and the Tchimpounga Chimpanzee Sanctuary. The main areas of intervention of ESI-Congo are scientific research, conserving education, supporting alternative economic activities and strengthening the local management system for natural resources and biodiversity.

PROGRAM (Protector of the Great Apes of Moukalaba) Association in Gabon

Established in 2004, PROGRAM operates in the south of Gabon, precisely in the eastern part of the Moukalaba-Doudou National Park (PNMD) and works in protecting gorillas, chimpanzees and elephants. Its mission is to preserve the biodiversity of the PNMD and its periphery and by integrating local populations in the process of conserving and enhancing their heritage.



Mbou Mon Tour (MMT) in Democratic Republic of Congo

Established in 2001, MMT is a Congolese association exercising its activity in the Batéké chiefdom, 2 kilometers from the village of Nkala, where it was established. Its mission is to support local communities in developing initiatives compatible with the conservation and rational management of biodiversity in the province of Mai-Ndombe. MMT ensures the protection of bonobos by involving local communities.



SEKAKOH

Based in Cameroon, SEKAKOH works to safeguard the forests located in the north of Sanaga (nearly 300 km east of the Dja Odzala Minkébé Landscape) and protect Nigeria-Cameroon chimpanzees in the Kom-Wum Forest Reserve, in the southern part of the proposed Ebo National Park, where lives a small population of gorillas and a subspecies of chimpanzees. Its approach is based on wildlife conservation through research, training, ecological monitoring, environmental education and community commitment.



Tropical Forest and Rural development (TF RD) in Cameroon.


TF-RD is an association working on the northern outskirts of the Dja Biosphere Reserve (RBD) and Campo 'ô man National Park. Established in 2010, TF-RD's mission is to help create a socio-economic environment supporting the empowerment of local communities and the conservation of biodiversity through four areas of intervention, namely environmental education; enhancement of NTFPs; promotion of agro-forests and ecotourism. TF-RD works to protect the gorillas and chimpanzees of the western plains.



Environment and Rural Development Foundation (ERUDEF) in Cameroon.

Established in 1999, ERuDeF operates today in the South-West, West and East regions of Cameroon for the conservation of wildlife and the protection of fragile eco-systems through research, training, education and community engagement.

Since 2017, the date of the beginning of the identity crisis which is being seen today in the North-West and South-West regions of Cameroon, part of ERUDEF's activities has been deported to the "Deng Deng" National Park in Eastern Cameroon.



Basankusu and Bolomba Ecosystem Conservation Support Group (GACEBB) in Democratic Republic of Congo

Founded in 2009, GACEBB operates in a part of the Basankusu territory, and all the Bolomba territory. Its 4 areas of intervention are support for local communities; environmental education; the fight against climate change; investigation and research. As MMT, its action is based on protecting the Bonobos


V.I. Enhance professional development of GSAC Alliance and its members

VII Upgrading the knowledge of members on the use of mapping tools and methods (GIS).

Following a first training organized in 2018 on using GIS and mapping tools and methodologies, field technicians from the 7 CSOs members of the GSAC Alliance participated in February 2020, for 5 days in Yaoundé, at a second training organized by the GSAC Alliance, the IUCN Small Initiatives Program (PPI). This training helped to strengthen and consolidate the participants' knowledge of the GIS language and the production of maps. Several sub-modules were reviewed, ranging from the review of databases to the delineation of intervention sites, including the acquisition of additional data. A certificate of completion of training issued by the GSAC Alliance was given to participants.

VIII Supporting 7 members in preparing and presenting financial reports

From 16 July to 12 August, the 7 CSO of the network benefited from the support of the GSAC Alliance RAF in preparing and presenting financial reports. After a theory-based training through video conference, an individual guidance for each CSO enable reinforcing and strengthening experiences and knowledge of the finance Manager chosen by each of its agencies. This support is an addition to the one provided in 2019 which led to drafting procedure manuals for every member of the network.

VLIII Drafting election procedures for leading structures and for travelling

Still in a goal to secure a transparent interior management and a good governance within the network, GSAC Alliance came-up with two (02) new ideas of interior management, namely the election procedure of leading structures and the travelling procedure. This two ideas are added to the procedure manual drafted and approved in October 2019.

VLIV Signing a partnership agreement between GSAC Alliance and Rastoma

The Network of Actors for the Conservation of Marine Turtles in Central Africa (RASTOMA) is a network of local African CSOs working for protecting turtles on African marine coasts. To date, it brings together those involved in the conservation of marine turtles in the 6 Central African countries with coastline on the Atlantic Ocean (Cameroon, Equatorial Guinea, Sao Tome and Principe, Gabon, Republic of Congo and Democratic Republic of Congo). Like the GSAC Alliance, RASTOMA has benefited since its establishment, from technical and financial support from IUCN.

At the wake of 2020, the GSAC Alliance and RASTOMA decided to pool some of their functional areas such as office sharing, administrative and accounting management, the scientific committee and communication, etc.

Since February 2020, a partnership agreement has been signed between RASTOMA and GSAC Alliance and to date, the two networks share the same offices in Yaoundé after several discussion and reconciliation sessions.

VI.V Support of the technical staff by the Chairman of the Alliance

During his mission in Cameroon, Guillaume Tati held several working sessions to support the technical staff based in Yaoundé. Several files related to organizing the forum were examined, meetings and interviews with various actors involved in preparing the event were held as well.

VI.VI Holding of the fifth ordinary General Assembly in Yaoundé, Cameroon, on November 20 and 21, 2020.

Funded by IUCN, the GSAC Alliance held its fifth ordinary GA on November 20 and 21, 2020 in Cameroon. This fifth meeting, held in the new offices of GSAC Alliance, permitted the members to take stock of the activities planned for 2019, rule on current decisions and come out with a working agenda for the year 2021.

During the forum, several important resolutions were taken, including developing a strategic plan for the Alliance over the next 5 years and establishing a scientific committee.

V.II. Influence policies for conservation of great apes



V.II.I Organizing the forum for the promotion of community conservation of great apes and biodiversity in Central Africa on November 18 and 19, 2020.

Faced with the continuous fall of great apes and their habitats around the world, civil society in Central Africa met from November 18 to 19, 2020 at the town hall of Yaoundé (Cameroon) to talk of community conservation of great apes and biodiversity of the forests of the Congo Basin. It was therefore during a forum organized by the GSAC Alliance, and which brought together more than a hundred participants (conservation practitioners, academics, students, donors, political authorities, etc.), that several conservation themes on these vulnerable species were discussed. As the first in Central Africa, this forum was organized under the theme *“Local initiatives to sustainably protect the great apes of Cameroon forests and Congo Basin”*.

V.II.II Intervention at the cooperation and cultural actions department of the French Embassy in Cameroon on November 05, 2020.

As part of the training sessions, leaders of Cameroon CSOs beneficiaries of the Funding Program for Innovative Projects of Civil Societies and Coalition of Actors (PISCCA 2020), the GSAC Alliance was invited to make a presentation to the Cooperation Department and of Cultural Actions (SCAC) of the French Embassy in Cameroon on November 05, 2020.

In front of about twenty representatives of local CSOs, the Chairman of GSAC Alliance gave a speech under the theme "Networking of CSOs in Cameroon and Central Africa: advantages and relevant experience of the GSAC Alliance".

This intervention is part of the will of the French Embassy in Cameroon to promote and encourage a framework of collaboration between Cameroonian CSOs.

V.II.III Participating in the preparatory webinar for Cop26 organized by the British High Commission and the Italian Embassy in Cameroon. 14 December 2020

In preparation for the COP 26 climate scheduled for November 2021 in Great Britain, the Technical Assistant of GSAC Alliance participated in a reflection webinar organized jointly on December 14 by the British High Commission and the Embassy of Italy in Cameroon. The main objectives of the webinar were firstly to encourage the positive commitment of the main stakeholders (administration, NGOs, civil society, private sector) and secondly to raise awareness on the various rising pressures on the environment and on the key role that these local actors must play.

During two hours webinar, presentations were made particularly on government policies and the actions of the Cameroon State in protecting





Appendix 1: Keynote address given by the representative of the Cameroon Minister of Wildlife and Forests.

"On behalf of the Ministry of Forests and Wildlife of the Republic of Cameroon, I am happy to proceed today to the opening of the Forum on Promoting Community Conservation of Great Apes and Forest Biodiversity in Cameroon and Congo Basin. This initiative led by civil society organizations in our country, supported by their co-organizations in the Central African sub-region, is to be welcomed.

This event is organized in a particular context. The whole world has suffered, since the start of this year 2020 and with full force, an unprecedented tragedy, marked by the sudden outbreak and virulence of the COVID 19 pandemic. This pandemic, with disastrous consequences on human lives, economies, including the conservation sector, is proving to be a new warning on great apes, which are already highly endangered.

In this same particular context, for four months, our country has seen its legislation for safeguarding and protecting great apes strengthened with the signature by the President of the Republic, Head of State, His Excellency Paul BIYA, of the Decree No. 2020/397 of July 27, 2020 on the accession of the Republic of Cameroon to the specific agreement on the conservation of gorillas and their habitats, adopted on October 26, 2007 in Paris, France.

Joining this agreement is a renewed political act of Cameroon's interest in the fate of endangered species in our forests. The commitment and solid implication of local and community actors present here, in, protecting biodiversity is a noble contribution to the public efforts that are constantly being deployed by the authorities, whether nationally or locally

Thanks to your field initiatives, you alert public opinion, you raise awareness, you educate, so much so that today, citizens are more and more sensitive to the fate, not only of great apes, but also of elephants, leopards, and all animal species endangered today and protected by our laws and regulations.

May I therefore say that your daily actions and your permanence in the field, alongside local communities, in these areas of high ecological value, are an assurance of conservation sustainability, which must be above all local and community-based for a greater efficiency. "
